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Co-director of the Centre for the History of the Gothic; co-editor of such titles as *Ecogothic* (2013) and *The Encyclopaedia of the Gothic* (2012); and author of such titles as *Gothic Death 1740-1914: A Literary History* (2016), *The Ghost Story 1840-1920: A Cultural History* (2011), and *Gothic Literature* (2013).

In the age of the Anthropocene, the interrogative study of the relationship between the human and nonhuman is vital. Our representations of the more-than-human in literature, film, mythologies, histories, and popular culture—our endless stories about Nature—are hugely important because they not only reflect but *inform* how we think and feel about the world around us, and impact how we subsequently treat it. The new journal, *Gothic Nature: New Directions in Ecohorror and the EcoGothic*, is a timely publication which focuses specifically on Nature's dark, nasty, eerie, and unsettling undersides, both real and imagined. Peer-reviewed and interdisciplinary, the journal features the latest exciting research in ecohorror and the ecoGothic from both renowned and new scholars, seeking to question and expand our existing ideas and definitions in these areas. To celebrate the release of the inaugural issue of *Gothic Nature*, we are holding a one-day symposium—generously hosted by the English and Creative Writing Department at The University of Roehampton—to bring together academics, artists, filmmakers, and enthusiasts working in various ways with the subject of Gothic Nature.

We invite proposals for 20-minute scholarly papers and 10-minute creative readings. We also welcome proposals for alternative or more unconventional modes and formats (critical or creative dialogues/conversations, performances, screenings, or presentations) by scholars, artists, and activists.

Topics might include, but are by no means limited to:

- Definitions and delineations: 'Gothic Nature', 'ecohorror', and 'ecoGothic'.
- 'Ecophilia' vs. 'ecophobia'.
- Ecocritical theory and the Gothic.
- Gothic and the 'cenes': Anthropocene, Capitalocene, Necrocene, Sustainocene, Cosmoscene, Econocene, Plantationocene, etc.
- Gothic ecology, Gothic geology, Gothic and climate change.
- Landscapes of fear: icescapes, forests, mountains, caves, oceans, etc.
- Nature monsters: wolves, trolls, wendigos, witches, huldra, Pan, etc.
- Ghosts in the landscape.

- Heritage noire (historically haunted landscapes).
- Religion and dark Nature.
- Animal horror, plant horror.
- Gothic writers and environmental activism.
- Gothic nature and representations of class/race/gender/sexuality, etc.

Proposals for panels are also welcome: please send a 200-word summary of the rationale for the panel, in addition to individual abstracts.
